The Museum on the Mezzanine

A small but very experienced project team is working on developing the display which is aimed primarily at families with children aged 6 - 11 approximately and also older residents. The characteristics of the display will include:

- graphic panels with simple text in a large font and illustrations
- cases of 3 dimensional material. Any objects from the present collections not used in the displays will continue to be stored at Gosport.
- drawers full of surprises
- "interactives" mostly as low tech as possible. There will be lots of computers elsewhere in the Discovery Centre.

The space allocated is approximately 100 square metres on the mezzanine floor of the current library building. The plan on the next page gives an idea of what the space will contain but very little is cast in stone yet. The plan is an architect's working drawing and is not intended at this stage to show accurately the Museum-elements.

The **main displays** will be as flexible as possible so that it is relatively easy to change the graphic panels and the contents of the display cases. The cases and drawers will be interspersed with the graphic panels and "interactives" are elements of the display which involve the visitor in some sort of activity for example a jigsaw, a game, some questions.

There are two main themes; "The Waterfront" and "In Living Memory".


"The Waterfront" will be in two sections. Side A will deal with leisure yachting, boat building, sail making, the seaside, royal connections etc. There will be a set of "interactives" for families based on the shipbuilding/sail making and possible other elements. Side B of the "Waterfront" will deal with Gosport's naval history and include Haslar Hospital, Priddy's Hard, Royal Clarence Yard, Sailor's Life etc. There will be a set of "interactives" based on victualling the Navy based partly on the cooper's model which we are recycling from the "Gosport Story" display in the present museum.

The graphic panels will be simple but eye-catching in format. They will be supported with additional material where possible for those who want to find out a bit more. If a visitor wants to know a lot more, they can visit the Local Studies building.

"In Living Memory" will tell the story of ordinary people in Gosport from the 1930s onwards. It will include wartime, social life, work, house and home, shopping, sport and leisure, and schools.

The sections on schools, work, house and home, shopping, sport and leisure have been identified as areas which can be easily changed to cover many aspects of Gosport life over time. For example, sport and leisure covers a vast area of life. The opening display might consist of a graphic panel and some objects about "Cinemas in Gosport". Several months later, that could be changed to a graphic panel and case about a local Gosport Sports Club put together by a local group working with the Curator. Several months (or maybe weeks) later this could be changed again to celebrate an anniversary.

Another example is shopping. We might have a graphic panel giving an overview of shopping in Gosport, from online to the little corner shop. The case and drawers accompanying the panel could start with a display of objects from a chemist's shop, be changed to a butcher's, to a grocer's - or the graphic panel could be changed to show the High Street as a shopping street with relevant material in the case and drawers.

This approach is experimental and it will obviously need resources to make it work.

Other elements on the plan on the previous page are:

"Optical Images" are "lenticulars", a sort of moving collage of images showing aspects of the displays to encourage visitors to explore further.

"Fortifications" is an important topic in Gosport and this will be dealt with by a computer presentation currently being developed.

The "Juke Box" is going to be a fun way of making film and sound archive available as tasters. This aspect is currently being developed - it won't now look like a juke box which was the original idea. Visitors can get a taste of some of the sound and film available from Wessex Sound and Film Archive in Winchester. If the visitor is interested they can then go to the Local Studies Area in the current Museum building for longer versions.

The "doughnut" in the middle of the space is "The Time Detective" section. Work units will be arranged around the column and visitors will be given the opportunity to investigate and find out more about objects.

Hampshire Museum and Archives Service has a great deal of expertise in developing these sort of activities and it will provide an excellent opportunity to get as many objects as possible into the public area.

The "People's Network" terminal will give visitors the opportunity to look at photographs and other digitised material if they wish

"Architectural Items" will be a "reminiscence" seating area including objects.

We have to be aware of equalities issues and try to ensure that all our visitors enjoy the experience. I would stress that the "Museum on the Mezzanine" is not designed for the local history expert - the Local Studies Area will provide for them. We do hope, though, that the finished result will look so attractive that everyone will want to visit again and again.

How can Friends Help?

It would be very useful for me to know your views about the proposals. I know not everybody is happy about the Discovery Centre concept in general but work is now well under way. The important thing now is to get the "Museum on the Mezzanine" as right as possible.
